

GUEST POLICIES

- 1. The use of drugs, weapons, and abusive language is prohibited at Camp Whitman.
- 2. The use of tobacco or e-cigarettes is prohibited at Camp Whitman.
- 3. Alcoholic beverages may only be consumed by guests over the age of 21, per NYS law. Alcohol is only permitted within guest lodging, or in the immediate vicinity of said lodging. Alcohol is not permitted in the Main Lodge, pool area, waterfront, archery range, or other program area at Camp Whitman. If an individual is consuming alcohol, or appears to be under the influence of alcohol or drugs, they may be denied access to a program.
- 4. The use of the pool (for swimming) without approval of Camp Whitman and a lifeguard on duty is strictly prohibited. Swimming is not permitted at the lakefront at any time.
- 5. The use of the low ropes course without trained Camp Whitman staff is strictly prohibited.
- 6. Use of vehicles is restricted to roads and parking areas designated by Camp Whitman on Seneca Lake. Posted speed limits shall be obeyed.
- 7. All fires must be contained within provided fire rings.
- 8. All families and groups are responsible for the supervision of their minors.
- 9. Quiet time is between 11 pm and 7 am. Any loud music or disruption to other groups is prohibited.
- 10. Respect the space of other families/groups and only enter your own cabins/spaces as rented.
- 11. Respect other families/groups in shared spaces (sports fields, dining hall, shower house) by cleaning up after your group and sharing the space.
- 12. Camp Whitman on Seneca Lake does not provide medical supervision, treatment, maintenance, or dispensing of medications for retreat and rental guests. Emergency transportation is available through local emergency response groups by dialing 911.
- 13. Friendly dogs are welcome at Camp Whitman. Dogs must be up to date on their shots and leashed anytime outside of your lodging. Picking up and disposal of all dog excrement is the responsibility of the dog owner.
- 14. All participants must maintain required personal hygiene, and protective health protocols as determined by camp, County and State officials.
